Job Description

POSITION TITLE: Horse Leader REPORTS TO: Volunteer Manager CURRENT AS OF: February 2020

POSITION SUMMARY: Take responsibility for the equine before, during, and after a class. Horse Leaders will ready the equine for class, lead the equine during class, put the equine away after class, and correctly put away tack and equipment.

JOB DUTIES

- Groom and tack equine as directed by instructor.
- Aid in mounting by leading the equine to the appropriate site.
- Lead the equine for the rider as specified by the instructor.
- Maintain safety in the arena by keeping equine at a safe distance from other equines, people, fences and other objects.
- Take the equine back to the appropriate stall or pasture, using the Buddy System.
- Follow all instructor and staff directions.
- Ensures compliance with all Hearts & Horses policies.
- Work as a team with staff and volunteers.

QUALIFICATIONS

- **Time Commitment**: Be able to commit consistently to at least one shift a week of at least 2.5 hours a shift. Shifts are available in the morning, afternoon and evening, each day of the week, except Sundays.
- Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age, unless an exception is made for extensive equine experience.
- All volunteers must be qualified as a Horse Leader volunteer, by participating in all Horse Leader trainings and passing a Horse Leading Assessment prior to volunteering.
- Able to frequently sit, stand, walk, bend and lift up to 50 pounds.
- Able to walk or jog for more than 1 ½ hours over uneven surfaces.
- Able to physically react with agility and swiftness to maximize safety of the rider and control of the equine.
